



EDITORYAL: The best and the brightest

Eleven Filipinos made it to the Asian Scientist 100, a list hat celebrates the region's most outstanding researchers across a range of scientific disciplines. Honorees must have received a national or international prize for their work, made a significant scientific discovery or shown leadership in academia or industry.

The Filipinos on the list come from various Institutions and scientific fields. Dr. Carlo Arcilla, Engr. Robert Dizon, Dr. Raymond Tan, Dr. Susan Gallardo, Dr. Raul Destura, Dr. Joselito Chavez, Dr. Alonzo Gabriel (), Dr. Alicia Aguinaldo, Dr. Emma Sales, Dr. Cleotilde Hidalgo and Dr. Emil Javier do all Filipinos proud, but most importantly they make contributions to humanity in their field of study without glorifying themselves disparaging others. They toil quietly with only their sharp minds, hard work, and passionate drive to make a difference.

The same can be said of countless other scientists and researchers, even though their individual names are not currently on hand. They put in the long hours and hold their work to the highest standards.

A tragedy, then, that some people in government are ignorant about the value that scientists have in building our nation.

These are people who do not make claims easily, unless they are supported by facts. Cer tainly, their words carry far greater consequence that the rambling of those who believe that the positions they occupy automatically confer upon them credibility and stature. 

Senator Win Gatchalian has filed a bill that aims to improve teacher education in the country through reforms in the Teacher Education Council (TEC).

Gatchalian's Senate Bill No. 1887 amends Republic Act No. 7784, the law that created the TEC, which seeks to achieve better coordination between the Department of Education (DepEd) and the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), ensure the link and coherence between pre-service education and in-service education, and improve teacher education outcomes. Pre-service refers to the training and education before becoming classroom teachers while in-service education covers those already working as teachers.

The TEC will set basic requirements and accredit teacher education programs in accordance with professional standards. These standards should be approved by the Department of Education (DepEd) or adopted by the TEC to set out expectations for professional practice of teachers and school heads. The TEC will also be tasked to evaluate Teacher Education Institutions (TEIs) annually based on its prescribed standards.

Bill seeking reforms to improve teacher education filed

TEC Secretariat by creating new offices. The Quality Teaching Office and the Quality School Leadership Office will ensure fair and consistent application of professional standards for teachers and school leaders respectively. The Quality Pre-Service Teacher Education Office will designate centers of excellence for teacher education, while the Research and Training Office will undertake research directed at teachers and school leaders. The Finance and Administration Office will also be formed to oversee matters such as human resources and financial functions.

The bill also institutionalizes the National Educators Academy of the Philippines (NEAP), DepEd's professional development arm, to provide and streamline professional development of teachers and school leaders.

According to Gatchalian, the dismal results of the Licensure Examination for Teachers (LET) in recent years add urgency on the need to improve the country's teacher education quality. From 2014 to 2019, LET results show that the average passing rate was only 28 percent for the elementary level and only 36 percent for the secondary level.

Considering the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, the bill mandates TEC to lay out plans that will ensure learning continuity during school closures, prolonged class suspensions, emergencies, or crises. Upholding the welfare of teacher and school heads will also become a function of the TEC under the proposed measure.

Gatchalian's bill also expands the TEC to include the heads of the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), the National Economic Development Authority (NEDA), and the Philippine Normal University (PNU) which is the national center for teacher education.

JTI to hike 2021 local tobacco buying to support COVID-hit farmers

Japan Tobacco Interna-(Philippines) Inc. tional (JTI) is studying the possibility of further increasing its procurement of locally produced tobacco from the current 4.6 million kilograms (kg) it has programmed to buy in 2021 to support local growers reeling from the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

In a letter jointly addressed to Finance Secretary Carlos Dominguez III and Agriculture Secretary William Dar, JTI said its planned purchase of 4.6 million kg of local tobacco leaf for 2021 represents an increase of 1 million kg from what it brought from farmers this year.

Its 2021 programmed purchases of local tobacco leaf make up a quarter of its estimated total leaf requirement for next year, JTI general manager John Freda said in his letter.

This volume is also well beyond the requirement provided under Republic Act (RA) No. 10351, which requires manufacturers or sellers of tobacco products to procure at least 15 percent of their tobacco leaf raw material requirements from locally grown sources. JTI's plan was

in response to the joint request of Secretaries Dominguez and Dar for the cigarette manufacturer to help support local growers and raise revenues for tobacco-producing provinces affected by the pandemic-induced economic shock by hiking its purchases of locally produced tobacco leaf.

In their letter, Dominguez and Dar pointed out that the strict quarantines imposed to curb the spread of COVID-19 had con-

strained the marketing flow of food and other agricultural goods, including tobacco, which is among the most affected crops as it is a non-food commodity.

Áccording to Dominguez and Dar, a study has shown that "only 30 percent of the total local tobacco production are bought from the farmers while the rest are imported" by cigarette companies.

"Your kind assistance will translate into realized income to farmers, which assures food on their table and revenues for local government units (LGUs)," they said in their letter addressed to JTI.

In response, JTI said its local team is coordinating with the company's global leaf supply chain to "explore the possibility of further increasing our local leaf tobacco purchases next year and in the coming years.'

Moreover, Freda said that even before the receipt of the letter from the two Cabinet secretaries. JTI has also been coordinating with the National Tobacco Administration (NTA) on the same

"The NTA initiated a series of meetings on the subject in anticipation of the next harvest and trading season which is expected to begin sometime in March 2021, with the goal of ensuring that all harvest next year will be procured," Freda said in his letter to the two Cabinet officials.

Freda assured Dominguez and Dar that "JTI Philippines is committed to support the Philippine government and the local tobacco farmers." (PR)

The Maitim and Kaybagal Section of the ongoing 4-lane Tagaytay Bypass Road Project in Tagaytay City, Cavite is now open to vehicular traffic.

Public Works and Highways Secretary Mark A. Villar on Wednesday, October 21, 2020 led the inauguration of the 1.54 kilometer road segment which is also complete with bike lane component.

The opened initial segments are part of the 8.59-kilometer Tagaytay Bypass Road that will divert traffic within the concested city roads of Tagaytay, running through Luksuhin, Sikat, Zambal, Guinhawa, Patutong Malaki, Balagbag, Salaban, Kaybagal, and Maitim road sections.

"The opening of these two (2) sections is only the beginning as we have been prioritizing the inclusion of Tagaytay Bypass Road Project in the national budget since 2018," said Secretary Villar.

According to Secretary Villar, Tagaytay Bypass Road when completed will reduce to only 20 minutes travel time from Alfonso towards Tagaytay City, saving as much as 33 minutes from the usual 53 minutes.

Aside from the Maitim and Kaybagal Section, DPWH is currently implementing road opening and concreting at the 746-meter Balagbag Section, road opening of

1.32-kilometer Salaban Section, road concreting of 590-meter Guinhawa Section; and road opening and concreting of 580-meter Patuto Section 3. DPWH has so far released an amount of P466.24 Million for the ongoing and completed sections of the bypass road project.

The entire stretch of Tagaytay Bypass road will also have a separated bike lane, as per Secretary Villar's Department Order 88 series of 2020 which requires the inclusion of bike lanes in all future national road and bridge projects. (DPWH.GOV)

NOTICES CONCEPCION LOOKING AT SALIV SPECIMEN FOR PCR TESTING

Presidential Adviser for Entrepreneurship and Go Negosyo founder Joey Concepcion mentioned during a presser held for the Project ARK and Mandaluyong Pooled Testing sponsored by BDO Foundation that he is looking to support a study exploring the use of saliva specimens for RT-PCR.

"If that research shows that saliva is as sensitive or even more sensitive than swab testing, then that would be another game-changer, because we would not need an [RT-PCR] extraction machine," said Concepcion.

A conventional nasopharyngeal swab may cause discomfort to individuals and pose a slight risk to healthcare administering workers the test. Concepcion suggests that using the less invasive saliva specimen can help overcome the reluctance of most Filipinos to get tested. It also has the potential to reduce the cost of RT-PCR tests since it eliminates swabbing altogether.

There are onclinical studies going exploring the viability of saliva samples as a low-cost alternative to conventional swab-based molecular tests. If the research proves conclusive, then it can expand the use of molecular tests where healthcare resources are limited.

"The direction is to make testing faster, cheaper, and more convenient to people. Whatever innovation is coming out, we are not closing the doors...These are good signs that we are really moving for innovation, for speed. That is the only way that we can open the economy safely," Concepcion said.

Concepcion supports testing innovations from other countries that can help create greater visibility on community-level infection and bring down the cost of testing. He adds that they are working closely with DOH and DOST to validate the viability of these innovative testing methods.

The move comes during the official launch of Go Negosyo pooled PCR testing in Mandaluyong. The city follows Makati which has already implemented the pooled testing methodology on a selected sample of its residents.

"The people of Mandaluyong are truly honored and grateful to be part of Go Negosyo pooled PCR testing. Indeed, this is a game changing innovation," said Mandaluyong Mayor Menchie Abalos. "The PCR pooled testing initiative is a private sector led effort that is anchored on the combined effort of the government and businesses to make massive testing possible at the community level...Malaking tulong po ito sa aming mga Metro Manila may-





National group wants gov't to fully open up economy, jump-start recovery process

The government should now fully open up economic activities to help jump-start the Philippine economy devastated by the lockdowns imposed to curb the spread the dreaded Covid-19 virus.

Ben Punongbayan, Chairman and Founder of the Buklod National Movement, said: "It is now time to open up the economy much wider to reduce the continuing economic decline. It is a difficult choice of course, but with proper safeguards, the risk of fatalities may be minimized to a very small extent."

For the first half of 2020, the Philippine economy has already declined by 9% compared with the first half of 2019. The International Monetary Fund (IMF), for its part, forecast for the Philippines an economic decline of 8.6% for the entire year 2020.

A close look at the supply side components of country's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) for the first half of 2020. as reported by the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas, shows that the industrial sector-which includes construction, composing 29% of current GDP-declined by 13.5%; while the service sector, constituting 61% of GDP, declined by 8.2%.

On the demand side, household consumption, constituting a very large 72.6% of the current economy, dropped by 7.8%; while capital formation, composing 18% of current GDP, declined by 36.6%. The supply and the demand sides of the economy, being two sides of the same coin, are of course interdependent, one similarly affects the other in the direction they take.

Punongbayan said these declines were caused by the imposed lockdowns to prevent the wider spread of Covid-19 virus. It shall be noted though that the large drop of the economy for this half-year period, which includes only a little more than three months of the contagion, indicates also the fragile nature of the Philippine economy. To illustrate that fragility, the Philippines showed the worst GDP losses of a little more than 12%, according to the recently released issue of IMF's World Economic Outlook. The study showed a comparison of its economic forecasts for the period 2020 to 2025 of countries around the world, from the update made in January 2020 to projections prepared in October 2020.

"The alternative of keeping a prolonged strict prohibition of movement of people under present economic circumstances may no longer be appropriate," said Punongbayan. "Especially so if it is done with the view of waiting for the arrival of a vaccine, not only because of the uncertain time of its arrival, but also of the long time needed to produce it and inoculate the right proportion of more than 100 million Filipinos." The chairman and CEO of Pfizer, Albert Bourla, even issued a statement specifically to lay down a realistic timeline and dampen expectations of the quick arrival of a vaccine.

In this connection, when considering succeeding alternative courses of action, Punongbayan added, the country may need to learn from the experience of our neighbors, particularly that of Vietnam.

This Southeast Asian country, which has been reporting a much lower number of COVID-19 infections than the Philippines, is expected to grow its economy in 2020 by 1.6%, a spectacular performance in the midst of practically declines all over the world. With such performance, the IMF expects that Vietnam could even overtake the Philippines in per capita GDP this year.

"While such an occurrence has long been expected in view of the continuing historical decline in the economic position of the Philippines among ASEAN countries, it still gives a feeling of sadness when we see it actually happens," Punongbayan said.

"We have to do our best to minimize our losses, both in terms of lives and the economy during this contagion," the Buklod founder said. Doing so needs a flexible containment policy and efficient surveillance, both employed with deliberateness to produce the needed optimum balance, he added. (PR)

DIY bike repair stations: GenTri SK project from the heart

The Sangguniang Kabataan (SK) council of Barangay Bacao II here thought long and hard on what project they need to develop that will make a big impact to people not just within their barangay but to all those who would need their service.

As the quarantine protocols loosened and the city as well as the province's economy started to reopen, workers return to their livelihood particularly those employed in the Cavite Export Processing Zone (CEPZ) and in Rosario town.

Hundreds of workers travel each day using bicycles as their means of transportation, since public transportation were allowed to operate with limited passenger capacity and to save what little they earn with the reduced working hours, effect of the ongoing pandemic.

"Nung nagsimula ang lockdown at nagbalik ang trabaho sa aming lugar ay naging pangunahing transportasyon ang bisikleta. Nag-isip ako kung ano ang pwede kong itulong sa aking mga kabataan na nagwo-work. Nakita ko ang mga nagba-bike na tulak-tulak at flat ang gulong at sira ang kadena, every day ganun ang nakikita ko. Kaya umisip ako ng paraan upang makatulong sa ating mga nagtatrabaho at yung mga namamalengke gamit ang bisikleta," shared SK Chairman Carlo dela Cruz.

(Since the start of the lockdown and work resumed in our area, bicycles became the primary means of transportation. I pondered on how I could be of help to my fellow youth who are working. Then I saw people pushing their bicycles with flat tires and broken chains. I saw the same scenario every day. So I thought of how I could be able to help these workers including those people who ride their bikes in going to the market.)

This inspired SK Chairman dela Cruz to put up DIY (Do-It-Yourself) bicycle repair stations along the stretch of the

Centennial road which are equipped with air pumps and tools.

Dela Cruz revealed that, "This project did not use any amount fromt the SK funds. This was funded from my three months' salary."

The youth group plans to put up 8 repair stations but initially set up 4 which are now being used by bikers and cyclists for troubleshooting. All 8 repair stations will be completed by November said the SK chair.

Aside from this, the SK members also distributed anti-radiation glasses to online class learners to protect the students' vision from long hours of exposure to laptops, and other gadgets during online classes. (PIA)

DILG to LGUs: Support operation of fisheries management areas

To ensure the sustainable management of coastal and fisheries resources nationwide, the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG) called on local government units (LGUs), especially those lying on coastal areas, to support the establishment and operation of the 12 Fisheries Management Areas (FMAs) across the country.

FMA is a spatial delineation of Philippine waters as a means to manage fisheries at an appropriate scale. The Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (BFAR) has established 12 FMAs composed of contiguous regions which share the same coasts.

DILG Secretary Eduardo M. Año said that the preservation and management of aquatic resources, including coastal and fisheries, like other functions of the government must not cease despite the COVID-19 crisis adding that LGUs should lead in the management of shared coasts and ocean for the benefit of all.

"The establishment of FMAs is provided by the law and it is the enshrined mandate of LGUs to protect and preserve our natural resources, including all coastal areas," Año said.

"Inaasahan po natin ang pangunguna ng ating mga LGU sa pagtiyak na ang mga FMA sa bansa ay napapangalagaan," he added.

Earlier, the Department of Agriculture issued Fisheries Administrative Order (DA FAO) No. 263, s. 2019 which pushes for the creation of FMAs that are fully functional and supervised by a governing body.

n support of the DA directive, Año issued DILG Memorandum Circular 2020-121 directing LGUs to be part of the multi-sectoral Management Board and to work with other sectors in ensuring that the shared resources and fish stocks within the FMAs are properly managed.

One or more local chief executive (LCE) of LGUs, Año explained, shall co-chair the said management board, together with the BFAR Regional Fisheries Office.

"Aquatic and fisheries resources are aspects of local governance that demand LGUs' attention and with a representative from the LGUs in the FMA Management Board, matitiyak natin na ang mga bayan sa coastal areas ay may katuwang sa pangangalaga sa mga resources nito," he said. Regional com-

position of the 12 FMAs are as follows: Regions 2, 3, 4A, and 5 for FMA 1; Regions 8, 13 and 11 for FMA 2; Regions 12, 9 and BARMM for FMA 3; Regions 6, 7, 9, and BARMM for FMA4; Regions 4B and 6 for FMA 5: Regions 1. 3. 4A, 4B and NCR for FMA 6; Regions 4A, 5, and 8 for FMA 7; Regions 8 and 13 for FMA 8; Regions 7, 8, 9, 10, and 13 for FMA 9; Regions 7, and 8 for FMA 10; Regions 5, 6, 7, and 8 for FMA 11; and, Regions 4A, 4B, 5, and 6 for FMA 12

Año also urged LGUs to participate in the development of the FMA Ecosystem Approach to Fisheries Management (EAFM) Plan or EAFM Framework which will lay down the policies and strategic actions of the FMA to be implemented by he LGUs and BFAR field offices within the FMA.

"EAFM Plans are the localized plans to translate the goals, objectives, and strategic directions of the FMA into actions kaya hinihiling ang masiglang pakikiisa ng mga pamahalaang lokal para ito ay mabuo," Año said. (DILG.GOV)
